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DEFINE YOUR ROLE



Define your role and your achievements

Describe exactly what you've done - instead of just writing 'volunteer at X', highlight your specific tasks and achievements.

When writing volunteer work on your CV, it's important to describe exactly what you did. Instead of just writing 'Volunteer at X', highlight your specific tasks and achievements.

Example: 'Planned and facilitated monthly patient webinars with +100 participants, increasing member engagement by 30%.'

This not only shows your involvement, but also the difference your efforts have made.

To make this even stronger, you can follow these steps:

Describe your tasks in detail:

What were your responsibilities?
What skills did you use?

Quantify your results:

Use numbers and data to show the impact of your work.

Focus on your contributions:

What value did you create for the organisation?
Did you help improve a process, increase visibility or strengthen the community?

Compare to previous situation:

If possible, mention how things were before your efforts and what improvement you have made.



Use Volunteering in Your Elevator Pitch

How to incorporate volunteering into your elevator pitch
